One of the struggles with recycling we currently have is there are fewer items we can toss in with comingled recycling. EHL has invested in training two of our staff to become Community Collectors through Lane County. Community Collectors can collect and return plastics that are not allowed in comingle. These plastics must be clean, dry, and sorted according to the number on the bottom of the item and their shape. After we collect at least two cubic yards, we can make an appointment with Lane County Public Waste to have it quality checked before they will accept it. Our EHL Community Collectors are Annie Foshay and Ryan Perry. See below for their answers to some of our recycling questions.



Annie is our Communications Specialist and has been with EHL since 2016. When she is not working on our recycling protocols, she works hard to keep the phones, website, computers, and internet working. Annie believes very strongly in sustainability and practices it in her own life, as well as at work. "I like to give everything a second life by buying used. Even when I'm shopping for something new, I like to make sure it is made of sturdy materials and has the potential to be used as something else if it can no longer be used for its original purpose." When asked if she had some



words of wisdom about recycling, she shared, "The best time to start reducing/reusing/recycling would have been 50 years ago. The second best time is today!". A fun little tidbit about Annie is that she and her daughter are raising milk goats and they have baby goats due this month! Annie says, "Baby goats are so fun to watch and cuddle!".

Ryan works within our Environmental Services and Maintenance Department. He started with EHL in September of 2020. He is seen in this photo in front of a recycling organization station he set up. We compost all of our food waste, recycle all electronics and appliances through NextStep Recycling, take our gently used clothes to St. Vincent DePaul, reuse building materials, and buy locally whenever possible.

Residents are encouraged to help with our sustainability commitment as well. They help peel labels from plastic tubs and assist in helping to take the compost bucket out to be dumped after each meal.

We purchase recycled products and utilize local vendors as much as possible. One thing we do in the office is something everyone could do at home as well. Before we toss a piece of paper in the recycle bin, we see if we can use it as scrap paper for notes or other purposes. For example, if a piece of paper only has printing on one side of it, we use the other blank side to write our "to-do" list or for a phone message.

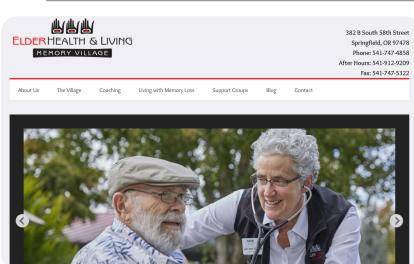
